MAY GOD GIVE YOU PEACE

Our sincere condolences as you experience this loss in your life. Although these days may be very difficult, they can also be the source of healing for you and your family.

Please take the time to read through this booklet and make the selections that will assist us in preparing the funeral rites for your loved ones.

HOW A FUNERAL WORKS

There are three “stations” to the funeral rites: **the wake, the liturgy**, and the commendation at **the cemetery**. The funeral rites can be a source of comfort and healing for those left behind. Participating in the planning process of a loved one’s funeral can make it a more personal, meaningful experience for those attending and a loving tribute to the deceased. The following instructions are meant to assist you in that preparation. In addition, Friar Rick or Friar Nicholas are available to assist you in whatever way they can at this difficult time for your family and friends.

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The Wake

This is a time to receive family and friends who want to pay their respect. It's also an opportunity to pray. You can ask if one of the friars is available to stop in and offer the Vigil Prayers. It's also a great time for people who might want to offer some words of eulogy.

The Funeral Liturgy

This may include the Catholic Mass or not. If most people are not Catholic and might feel uncomfortable it's possible to have the liturgy without the Catholic Mass. Here are some selections that will need to be made to prepare for the Liturgy. You will select readings and also select people to do the readings.

Reading I: The first reading may be chosen from the Hebrew Scriptures. During the Easter Season select this reading from the New Testament. Non-biblical texts may not replace scriptural readings at Mass. The family should choose a family member or friend to proclaim the reading.

Responsorial Psalm: The responsorial psalm is sung by a cantor. The family may request a particular psalm and the organist will choose a musical setting for that psalm. The family may also request a particular musical setting if they wish.

Reading II: A second reading is optional. If the family chooses to have one, it should come from the New Testament. Non-biblical texts may not replace scriptural readings at Mass.

Gospel: Although the deacon or a priest proclaims the Gospel, the family may select the one that will be read.

Homily Preparation: To assist the friar as he prepares the homily for the funeral liturgy please think of the highlights/key events of the deceased's life. What were some of the passions of his/her life and why? What were some of his/her Christian virtues? What would be important for Friar to know about your loved one as he prepares the homily? You can either meet with the friar preparing the funeral or email your thoughts. Also please include the obituary if possible.

General Intercessions: The family should choose one of the sets of Prayers of the Faithful. Again, the family should choose someone to read the intercessions

Presentation of the Gifts: The family may choose two people to carry the offertory gifts to the altar. The family may also choose not to have an offertory procession. **Not available during COVID**

Remarks of Remembrance: The Catholic liturgy does NOT include eulogies. Eulogies may be offered at the funeral home, the grave or at the reception after the funeral. However, if the family desires, they may have one person come forward after Communion to offer some remarks of remembrance lasting no longer than 3-4 minutes. The remarks at the liturgy should be focused on the deceased's Christian virtues and not simply memories.

Signing the Book of Remembrance: Assumption Parish has a custom of listing the names of all the deceased in a Book of Remembrance. The family is asked to appoint one member who will sign the name of the deceased in Assumption's book. This will be done shortly after Communion.

Special Music Requested: If there are particular hymns that the deceased or family would like to suggest they should let us know as soon as possible. If suitable these will be integrated into the liturgy as best possible. It is not possible to include "secular" or "pop" music. The Music Director will organize the music.

The Cemetery

The body or cremated remains for your loved ones are sacred. As Catholics we believe in the dignity of the body itself and in the Resurrection of the Body. We are only truly ourselves when we complete; body and soul. Therefore, the physical remains of a person should be treated with the utmost respect. The deceased's body or ashes should be buried in the ground or in a mausoleum. Ashes should be placed in a permanent place such a columbarium or buried in the cemetery. As tempting as it may be, and sentimentally appealing a person's ashes should be not separated, made into jewelry or given away as keepsakes. These are not your loved one's possession, but rather their very self. The same can be said for spreading ashes in a significant place. It may sound nice at at the moment but thousands of years of experience has taught us that in the long run it's better to have a distinct and dedicated place for your loved one's remains to await the Resurrection.

FIRST READING

Outside Easter Time: Old Testament

Priest: "Brothers and sisters, Jesus Christ is risen from the dead and sits at the right hand of the Father, where he intercedes for his Church. Confident that God hears the voices of those who trust in the Lord Jesus, we join our prayers to his:"

Deacon: "In baptism N. received the light of Christ. Scatter the darkness now and lead him (her) over the waters of death."

Lord, in your mercy: *Hear our prayer.*

Deacon: "Our brother/sister N. was nourished at the table of the Savior. Welcome him (her) into the halls of the heavenly banquet."

Lord, in your mercy: *Hear our prayer.*

Deacon: "Many friends and members of our families have gone before us and await the kingdom. Grant them an everlasting home with your Son."
